SNOW, SNOW, AND MORE SNOW

Dear Residents,

The winter of 2022-2023 is on track for a record amount of snow. The significant snows received to date have challenged the Town in its efforts to clear the snow effectively and efficiently. We recognize that we have not done the job we'd like to do and are taking steps to improve our capabilities by obtaining new equipment. We are also aggressively recruiting additional staff.

One thing that we have NOT been doing is strictly enforcing our Winter Parking Regulations. We will step up enforcement immediately. We also need the Town residents to better understand our snow removal regulations. To that end, we are sharing the key elements of the regulations. The full set of regulations can be found in Sections 7.18 and 8.09 of the Hideout Town Code which can be viewed on the Town's website. www.hideoututah.gov / Town Code

- Do not park on the street during snow events and for a full 24 hours after the snow stops. This includes builders and their sub-contractors. If you are building a home, and a snow event occurs, your building progress will be impacted.
- If you are parked on the street during a snow event, your car may be towed at your expense.
- Do not block the street while collecting mail from the mailboxes.
- Dig out fire hydrants within 72 hours after the snow has stopped. This is for your own and your neighbors' safety. If the fire hydrant is on your property, it is your responsibility to dig it out.
- Do not shovel or push snow from your property onto the streets. If we see you do this, we will cite you.
- The Town does not plow roads/streets that have not been officially accepted by the Town. Roads not accepted are considered private property and are subject to private snow removal regulations outlined in Sections 7.18 and 8.09 of the Town Code.
- The Town incurs no liability for damage to any item installed in the right-of-way (shrubs, signage, etc.).
- The Town clears the main arteries first. Then the connector roads, then dead ends and cul-de-sacs. If you are located on a secondary or tertiary street, you will not see snowplows as frequently as the main arteries.
- The Town is not responsible for removing snow that accumulates at the end of your driveway due to its snow-plowing efforts. That means we will continuously create a berm at the end of your driveway as we plow. Unfortunately, you or your HOA will have to clear the berm.
- If the Town's equipment is damaged by construction equipment or debris, the builder or developer is responsible to cover the costs of the repairs as well as any costs associated with mitigating the loss of equipment such as rental equipment needed to maintain the snow removal activities.
- If we must cite you for a violation, it will cost \$200 for each violation per day.
