Hideout Continues to be Proactive With

The Wildfire Risk Mitigation and Permanent Fire Station Committee is in early formation and is meeting on a bi-weekly FIREWISE USA° basis with the following Residents reducing wildfire risks

"To be the area's leader in community wildfire risk reduction and resiliency, with the goal of protecting lives and property. We seek to promote, educate, and incorporate fire and risk mitigation best practices for Hideout.

We expect to tackle issues including creating a permanent fire station within Hideout, educating residents on the need for their participation in risk mitigation, and creating a "Firewise"

community. (National Fire Protection Agency) Plans are in the works for a symposium in July with Utah Insurance Commissioner Jon Pike as keynote speaker. We also plan on a future Open House for Hideout residents on this topic.

Currently Town Council members Ralph Severini and Jonathan Gunn are leading this initiative with participation from Wasatch Fire District leaders and a representative from GCD, one of our core Hideout developers.
